 $^3$ Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort,  $^4$ who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God. <sup>5</sup>For just as we share abundantly in the sufferings of Christ, so also our comfort abounds through Christ. <sup>6</sup>If we are distressed, it is for your comfort and salvation; if we are comforted, it is for your comfort, which produces in you patient endurance of the same sufferings we suffer. <sup>7</sup>And our hope for you is firm, because we know that just as you share in our sufferings, so also you share in our comfort.

<sup>8</sup>We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about the troubles we experienced in the province of Asia. We were under great pressure, far beyond our ability to endure, so that we despaired of life itself. Indeed, we felt we had received the sentence of death. But this happened that we might not rely on ourselves but on God, who raises the dead. <sup>10</sup>He has delivered us from such a deadly peril, and he will deliver us again. On him we have set our hope that he will continue to deliver us, <sup>11</sup>as you help us by your prayers. Then many will give thanks on our behalf for the gracious favour granted us in answer to the prayers of many. (2<sup>nd</sup> Corinthians 1 NIVUK)

For those of you who either attended, or watched, the service of worship on 30<sup>th</sup> October 2022, you'll no doubt recognise the first section of these verses: we used them as our call to worship. This set the foundation for our time of worship, as we reflected together on the theme of the Comfort of God (as presented in Isaiah 40).

It is interesting that, as we look to what follows in 2<sup>nd</sup> Corinthians, Paul goes on from talking about the comfort of God, to sharing about the troubles and trials he and his helpers faced in the province of Asia. A cursory reading of these 2 paragraphs may suggest that they are very much in contrast to one another - one of comfort, the other of pain. Yet, I do not think these paragraphs are a contradiction; rather, I think one flows naturally from the other.

Paul talks first about God's comfort because, in his experience, that is what allows him to persevere through pain and suffering. Indeed, despite feeling like he had "received the sentence of death", he is able to take a step back. experience the comfort of God, and thus reflect more clearly on his situation. He comes to understand that his suffering has a purpose: to increase his reliance upon God (and not himself); to broaden his appreciation of God's salvation (both temporal relief from his circumstances, and ultimate rescue from sin through Jesus Christ); and that many may be moved, not just to pray, but to celebrate when prayer is answered.

The comfort of God in difficult circumstances, therefore, is a means by which we can reflect more clearly on our situations, see God at work in and through them, and increase our reliance upon Him. We access the comfort of God, as Paul reveals in the opening verses, through our faith in Jesus Christ: believing that by His death and resurrection, the sin and darkness of our world is dealt with, and we are given the hope of relief - if not in this life, then definitely in the next.

Why share this message with you in this pastoral letter?

I remain concerned that we are on the cusp of some kind of modern-day exile. I think the signs point to things getting worse (culturally, in society, and in our denomination) before there is any hint of them getting better. If my perception is correct, that means we may well be in for a challenging and difficult time.

As tough as this may be to hear, I do not want any of us to be moved to despair! If the series in Isaiah has shown anything thus far, it is that there is great hope, even in the darkest times; and we who believe in Jesus Christ can live in the light of that hope, even as the world is consumed by darkness. That is the point of highlighting these verses from 2<sup>nd</sup> Corinthians - it is another reminder to us all that, thanks to Christ, when the darkness closes in, we need not despair. Instead, we fix our eyes all the more firmly on Jesus, receiving assurance of both comfort and salvation – all of which moves us to do as Paul does, and proclaim, "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ"!



#### Finance Report

The income for the year to date is better than this time last year mainly due to the recovery of the hall let income. The year-to-date deficit at the end of September was around £20.000 although the claim for the Gift Aid recovery this year has still to be made and that should add another £11K of income by the year-end. This will offset planned expenditure regarding the installation of low energy lights in the Halls and repairs to three of the external doors.

#### **Bible Reflection November 2022**

As we approach the season of advent our thoughts turn to celebrating the birth of our Saviour and Lord. Over this period many carols will be sung and this is a good time to reflect upon and consider afresh the lyrics and the theology behind them.
